Recently opened at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art: "nano," a cool art/science exhibit for geeks of all ages:




exhibition that merges the arts and the atom by presenting the world of nanoscience through a participatory aesthetic experience. The exhibition, a collaboration between LACMALab and a UCLA team of nanoscience, media arts, and humanities experts, is free to the public and runs through September 6, 2004 in LACMA's Boone Children's Gallery.

This groundbreaking project provides a greater understanding of how art, science, culture, and technology influence each other. The exhibition addresses sophisticated subject matter that is especially relevant for the next generation. Modular, experiential spaces using embedded computing technologies engage all of the senses to provoke a broader understanding of nanoscience and its cultural ramifications. **RUSS KICK** is the author of several books, including *The* Disinformation Book of Lists and 50 Things You're Not Supposed to *Know.* He is also the editor of many **Disinformation** anthologies. The Israeli spy agency Mossad emerged from the shadows Monday when it launched a Web site to attract recruits for "special tasks" -- as well as intelligence analysts, waiters and drivers.

Long a secretive elite, Mossad is raising its profile to compete with the private sector in the search for talent.

"Mossad's mainstay is its people," reads the site's (www.mossad.gov.il) foreword by agency chief Meir Dagan, posted next to backlit photographs of unnamed intelligence analysts at their desks.


# **Another Forgotten WWII Ammo Explosion**

In response to my post about the neglected West Loch disaster, M.
L. has alerted me to an even worse ammunition kaboom during World War II: the Port Chicago Naval Magazine Explosion of 1944, which produced a detonation of Krakatoan proportions and killed 320 personnel, including 202 African Americans. It led to a mutiny and the mass courtmartial of 50 men.
